Louisville, KY. Kentucky Opera announces its 2024/25 season, which brings sweeping stories and groundbreaking theatre to Kentuckiana. Four new productions — all directed by women; new concerts; and new programs for younger audiences, the season is packed with world-class productions and exciting experiences.

"We have expanded our offerings for everyone this year, providing a greater variety of experiences for people of all ages and interests," says Barbara Lynne Jamison, Kentucky Opera General Director + CEO.

Kentucky Opera opens its 2024/25 season with a limited run of **Puccini**'s heartbreaking tragedy **Madama Butterfly**. Puccini's luxurious score is filled with vulnerability, power, and emotion. In this bold production set post WWII, Director **Mo Zhou** and her all-AAPI female creative team explore how this story still resonates today. **Francesco Milioto** conducts the Kentucky Opera Orchestra with **Sachie Ueshima** in the title role and **Adam Diegel** as Pinkerton in their Kentucky Opera debuts.

Kentucky Opera continues the holiday opera tradition with a one-act English-language, family-friendly production in December. Since its premiere on television Christmas Eve, 1951, **Gian Carlo Menotti**'s classic **Amahl and the Night Visitors** has been performed across the globe and in many languages. Kentucky Opera's new production explores the life of nomadic, displaced individuals in the 1930s who find acceptance, generosity, and joy, even in the most difficult circumstances. This beloved holiday classic is directed by **Kelly Kitchens.** Due to popular demand, Kentucky Opera added a performance, giving you more opportunities to create and celebrate your own annual holiday traditions.

The season continues during Black History Month with *This Little Light of Mine,* an opera inspired by the life of Fannie Lou Hamer, a former Mississippi sharecropper's daughter who rose to national prominence at the 1964 Democratic National Convention. Composed by **Chandler Carter** to a libretto by **Diana Solomon-Glover**, *This Little Light of Mine* was co-commissioned with Santa Fe Opera in 2019 and workshopped in Louisville in 2021. Kentucky Opera brings Fannie Lou Hamer's story to the stage in this brand-new production led by Stage Director **Kimille Howard** with Conductor **Everett McCorvey.** Full of familiar civil rights tunes from the 60s, this opera unflinchingly spotlights experiences of many Black Americans who exercised their right to vote.

The Opera Center for Cultural Health delights many audiences with its powerfully intimate setting. Composed in 1748 by Jean-Philippe Rameau, *Pygmalion*, the story of a man seeking the perfect companion, gets a fresh and relatable update. Kentucky Opera's brand-new production sets this opera in the 1950s against the backdrop of the perfect family home, weaving the original myth through a wife's, Cephise, perspective as she tries to be everything but herself. The Kentucky Opera Baroque Ensemble, led by **Stephen Stubbs**, anchors this opera in its history, while Director **Tara Branham**'s new concept shatters external

pressures, allowing Cephise to define her own destiny. Tenor **Marc Molomot** in the title role, with **Tess Altiveros** as Cephise.
